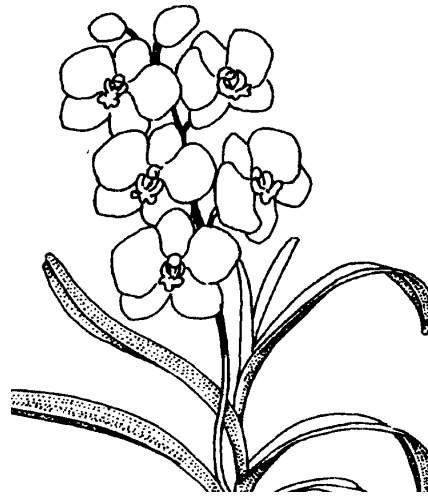
TRASH IT OR RESCUE IT?

All of us have been faced with the decision to trash an orchid we have nearly killed. If it is a favorite, and you have some patience, oftentimes it can be rescued.

If it has not failed due to disease or an onslaught of bugs, remove the orchid from its pot. You will probably discover the roots are rotted or almost non-existent. Wash off all the potting mix and with sterile scissors or a razor blade, trim away the "mushy" roots. Treat the cuts with a fungicide such as Physan 20, or dust with cinnamon ~ a natural fungicide!

Next, wrap a small ball of dampened sphagnum

moss
(preferably New Zealand sphagnum) around the roots and tuck into the corner of a suitably sized Ziploc bag. Seal the bag and pin a corner to the wall of your greenhouse or growing area where there is plenty of light.



Leave the bag tightly closed (watering not necessary) and after 4-6 months you should be rewarded with new roots. The worst that can happen? You finally killed off your nearly dead plant!

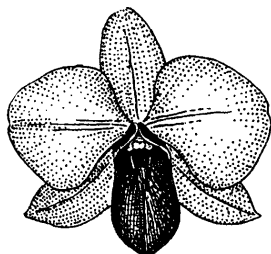

SPRING SHOW AND SALE NUTS AND BOLTS



- ✓ Volunteers – be there early and if you aren't busy, check to see where help is needed.
- ✓ Use ramp at building exit 39 near Parking Lot C for entry to the Show.
- ✓ The Show is in the Ten Hoeve Center, rooms 1604, 1608, 1610, 1612. Additional rooms are reserved for hospitality, judging, and videos.
- ✓ Remember that you will need to provide your own backdrop if you are a vendor or are displaying plants.
- ✓ Skirts are provided for the tables and Martin Taylor is providing the plastic to cover the rug in the display areas.. Thanks for your generosity, Martin.
- ✓ Remember to put plastic under your exhibit, especially if you have a water feature.
- ✓ Ladders are **NOT** provided by the College or the IOS.
- ✓ Anyone unloading nursery trucks should use the loading ramp across from Lot C.
- ✓ Bring plastic bags for those purchasing plants at the Show. It's a great way to recycle!

- Be sure to wear your member badge to all IOS meetings. We have a lot of new members, and the badges help people feel more at ease and welcome. Most definitely wear your badge during the Spring Show and Sale!

IOS and AOS Plant Judgings

This information is included here for your use at the Spring Show. It was adapted from the 2002-2003 Membership Directory. Please retain for future reference.

IOS MONTHLY JUDGING

IOS members are strongly encouraged to bring their blooming orchid plants to monthly meetings for judging. Any plant submitted for monthly judging (or AOS judging) must have been grown by the exhibitor for at least a six-month period prior to the judging date. Plants are grouped into three categories for judging: 1) Grown by members under lights/on windowsills; 2) Grown by non-commercial members in a greenhouse; 3) Grown and exhibited by commercial members (those selling more than 200 plants per year). Judges look at the general condition of the plant, but mainly judge according to the attributes of the flowers: size, shape (roundness and balance), number (the more the better), and color (is it clear, deep, unusual?). Color breaks are a negative attribute. Other negative flower qualities are dry, old-looking blooms and brown/black spots. Based on these features, compared to other plants of the same species or hybrids seen in the past by the judging team, plants may or may not be awarded a first or second place, or a Special award. Monthly IOS ribbons carry the following point values accumulated toward annual awards in June: 1st place = 10 pts.; 2nd place = 5 pts.; no award = 1 point; Special award (plant-of-the-month) = 20 points. All point scores are doubled for plants awarded at shows, our own or those of sister societies. Be certain to participate in this Society activity, even if you only have one plant in bloom. Remember, the important thing is we were all beginners once, so don't be shy about submitting plants for judging. Blooming orchids are beautiful and deserve to be shown off at every opportunity.

Plant Preparation

- 1) Do not exhibit plants infested with insects or showing any signs of fungal, bacterial, or viral infection. Such plants will be segregated by the judges and are not eligible for IOS awards.
- 2) Remove dead leaves and wipe the live leaves with a damp cloth to remove dust and water spots. A dilute solution of water and lemon juice or milk may be used but do not spray leaf-shine oils on orchid leaves.
- 3) Stake the inflorescence, if necessary, to show the flowers at their best advantage.
- 4) Fill out a plant registration tag for each plant you submit for judging.

AOS Judging and Away Shows

Again, don't be shy about participating in away shows. You can learn volumes by sending your plants to shows and, if possible, attending those shows to see how your plants compare to others in the same categories. Drop-off times at members' homes who take the plants to away shows are announced in the Newsletter and at meetings prior to each show.

Label Correctly

Prepare plants for judging by cleaning them and staking them as needed. Be certain there is a plant label in the pot or attached securely to the mount or pot. The identifying plant label should indicate the genus (e.g. Paphiopedilum, Phalaenopsis, Cattleya) and the species or hybrid. Print (do **not** use cursive) and use appropriate upper and lower case lettering. Do not label plants in upper case letters only. Species are written in all lower case (e.g. Paph. niveum). Hybrids are written with the name of the hybrid in initial caps (e.g. Phrag. Hanne Popow). Correct labeling avoids confusion over classification during judging.

Classify Plants

Obtain a copy of the Mid-America Orchid Classification from the IOS web page or ask help from a more experienced member. It takes some trial and error to learn to do this correctly, but it increases your understanding of orchid classification.

Plant List

On a piece of paper, write your name and the date (or the Show name) and list each plant you are entering into the Show. Type or print clearly the name of the plant using appropriate upper and lower case letters.



2004 SHOW DATES

That's right, 2004! Put these dates on your calendar now. You don't want to miss the best show around.
Spring Show – April 2nd, 3rd, and 4th at OCC.
Fall Mini-Show – October 1st, 2nd, and 3rd at OCC.

IOS ELECTIONS

A Nominating Committee is currently preparing a slate of candidates to fill upcoming Board vacancies and Officers of the Society.
