## **How to Grow *Neofinetia falcata***

Article by James Rose reprinted from the AOS Bulletin April 1994,

*Neofinetia falcata* is one of the most adaptable orchids, making it extremely easy to grow using a wide variety of methods. In Japan, in nature, it clings to moss-and lichen-covered trunks. Hobbyists can create epiphytic conditions several ways. The Japanese use New Zealand sphagnum moss, while Thai growers cultivate the plants in teak baskets with no medium. One of these methods should work for anyone wishing to try this species. A bark medium for Cattleyas is satisfactory, although most of the roots end up outside the container. Currently, at Cal-Orchid, Inc.\* we have found that osmunda fiber, although more expensive than bark, is the best for plants in both pots and baskets.

Water thoroughly twice a week in late spring and summer. This is typhoon season in the plant's native habitat, which is the time of active growth. Apply moderate doses of balanced fertilizer every other watering at this time. In late autumn and winter, the plants are quite dormant; give less fertilizer then.

In preparation for the spring bloom season, grow plants under bright filtered light. If too little is given, the plant will become soft and weak. Due to its small size, *Neof. falcata* can be grown on windowsills successfully. The temperature range is best kept between 50° and 80° F, although this durable species can tolerate more extreme temperatures. When these simple guidelines are followed, *Neof. falcata* rewards the grower with a profusion of coconut-and spice-scented flowers from spring into summer.

## **"Baggit" and Other Good Advice**

I saved a life last month! One of my favorite orchids, an awarded *Phalaenopsis stuartiana*, was down to one leaf, one pathetic looking leaf and no plump roots. Desperate, I took a clear plastic bag from the supermarket, a handful of damp sphagnum moss, and I bagged it. The bag had to be large enough to hold the plant without touching its' surface. I clipped the bag closed and put it on a shaded shelf in the greenhouse, in effect, a greenhouse within a greenhouse. Weeks later, I have two new leaves and I've potted it with plastic peanuts in a 2" layer topped with sphagnum. I breathe on it a lot because plants thrive on carbon dioxide. If it doesn't start new roots, it's back to the bag!

You can also bag plants when you go on vacation. Water thoroughly before you bag them. Years ago, because I was leaving town for a couple of weeks, I put all my houseplants in the

bathtub, sprinkled them lightly with water and covered the top of the tub with weighted down cleaners' bags. There is a window in the bathroom so the plants had some light daily. When I returned two weeks later, the plants looked like **they** had been on vacation! One more bit of advice. If your orchids aren't cooperating, write "omy" on their tags. I learned that from our best grower years ago. It stands for "one more year." They'll get the message.

### **Open Letter to Members**

We are so lucky to belong to a large, strong orchid society. We are able to tap into our communal knowledge about plants and growing – and we have a great resource in our membership. We have access to wonderful rare, exotic, and beautiful awarded plants owned by our members. We see them at each monthly meeting. We can enjoy their beauty and fragrance, and learn how to grow them to perfection. We can share our enthusiasm with these other orchid growers, and know that everyone appreciates how challenging it is to grow an orchid well, and bloom it. We can learn from all of the great speakers that our society brings in for our education and pleasure. Not all societies are able to bring in the well-known speakers that we take for granted. Smaller societies look within themselves for their educational programs, and only have guest speakers occasionally.

The size of our society is an asset. There are more of us to contribute our dues to allow us to afford the luxury of our monthly programs. But our dues only cover a part of our annual budget. The rest of our income comes from our shows, from plant sales, and from books, raffles, donations, and plant sales. Without these sources of income, our society would not be able to pay the fares and fees for our monthly speakers. The people who attend our shows, who buy our plants and books and raffle tickets

provide the balance of our income, to support our educational programs.

But there needs to be a 'show' to attract these people to us, to inspire them to want to join our society, read a book about orchids, take a chance on a new kind of plant to grow. That is where you come in, in two ways.

One is to support our home shows with your blooming plants – the 'show'—and with your volunteer time. We need your friendly faces to greet our guests and talk to them.

We need your help with all of the little things that need to be done at the show. We need your sale plants, to help support the activities of the society. Two is to support our away shows. Our neighbor societies – Batavia, Blackhawk, OGG, Wisconsin, NEW, Michiana, Illowa, and several others send displays to our show, and help us by providing more 'show' for our visitors. We need to reciprocate by bringing displays to their shows, and help them keep their societies viable and lively. We need you to send your plants to our away shows. We are a large society, and should be sending the largest, showiest display with the best plants in the area. We are that large, and our members have a high level of quality, well grown plants. We should be seeing those plants at our away shows.

**The point is** that the Illinois Orchid Society can only function at the level that we all expect it to, if **everyone** contributes to its success. We can only be as successful as we **all** work to be. If you only attend meetings to hear the speakers, you are getting far more than your money's worth from your dues. We need more from you. We need your involvement in the society. Bring plants – to monthly meetings, to home shows, and to away shows. Bring something for the hospitality table. Bring your extra plants to the sale table. Volunteer your time to help at a home show or away show. Some of them are quite close. Batavia, Rockford, Milwaukee are close enough for a day trip.

Volunteer to help at the monthly meeting. There is always something you can do to help.

And please, volunteer your good ideas. We each expect something from our membership in the

society, and in order to provide what you need, we have to hear from you. All of the board members are listed in the directory and in the newsletter, with phone and email contact numbers. Please let us know what you want from the society. Suggest a workshop, suggest a speaker, suggest a new way to make money. We want your experience as a member of the IOS to be fulfilling for you and your orchids.
