The View from the Speaker's Chair

Francisco Miranda visited with us at our November meeting to present an overview of Brazilian species cattleyas. Francisco opened with a fascinating review of the geography and variation in habitats where Brazilian orchids can be found. He then proceeded to unpack the sometimes-subtle differences between the various species types divided into bilfoliate, unifoliate and "other" categories. Francisco spoke passionately about his beloved species cattleyas closing with his thoughts and concerns about how, even with select line breeding, subtle hybrids with species-like traits are slowly setting the standard in AOS judging. In the fullness of time, Francisco predicts that "true" species will be a thing of the past at least at the judging table. That would be a real shame. Given his brisk table sales, I'm proud to see IOS members doing their bit to promote growing fine species cattleyas. I'm looking forward to seeing the plants you all purchased grown-up and flowering for our monthly club judging.

By the way, I forgot to mention when introducing Francisco last month that he is a published author. If Brazilian species cattleyas have captivated your imagination then I'd encourage you to go deep with some further reading. Tricks of the Trade – Trash It or Rescue It?

All of us have been faced with the decision to trash an orchid we have nearly killed. If it is a favorite, and you have some patience, oftentimes it can be rescued. If it has not failed due to disease or an onslaught of bugs, remove the orchid from its pot. You will probably discover the roots are rotted or almost non-existent. Wash off all the potting mix, and with sterile scissors or a razor

blade, trim away the "mushy" roots. Treat the cuts with a fungicide such as Physan 20, or dust with cinnamon ~ a natural fungicide! Next, wrap a small ball of dampened sphagnum moss (preferably New Zealand sphagnum) around the roots and tuck into the corner of a suitably sized Ziploc bag. Seal the bag and pin a corner to the wall of your greenhouse or growing area where there is plenty of light. Leave the bag tightly closed (watering not necessary) and after 4-6 months you should be rewarded with new roots. The worst that can happen? You finally killed off your nearly dead plant!

- **Cattleya dowiana 'Kathleen'**, Award of Merit (AM) 80 points. The owner is: Dr. Bill Rogerson.
- **Paphiopedilum Barbi Playmate 'Hampshire'**, Award of Merit (AM) 81 points & a Certificate of Cultural Merit (CCM) 82 points. The owner is: Arnold J. Klehm.
